## SPECIAL Update



This newsletter is a heartfelt testimony about Alan and me, as we approach a very special wedding anniversary. It is a brief reflection of our life together that I would like to share with you.

On November 27 this year,

Alan and I will be celebrating **40 years of marriage**. It has been an amazing journey for the two of us, from raising six children in the idyllic Noosa hinterland, in Queensland, Australia, to raising over 50 children from dysfunctional, abusive backgrounds, in the southern Mexican city of Tapachula in Chiapas.

As in any marriage, there have been many highs and lows throughout our life together. We started our married life very young, with no financial security, and survived with very few material possessions for a number of years.

We managed to buy our first home on the picturesque coast of N.S.W. after spending two years living in outback Queensland, which I might add, was quite a challenge for coastal 'kids'.

After four years, we sold our home and travelled the east coast of Australia in an old mobile home with three young children under the age of five, discovering the beauty of Australia's amazing coastline. Twelve months later, after an incredible journey exploring bush lands and rainforests, coral and sand islands, and the fascinating Barrier Reef, we settled on an acreage, where we lived in a tin shed, (with no relief

from the hot Queensland sun), for the next three years. We grew our own veggies and managed to collect a number of farmyard animals, including horses and a milking cow, to provide for our family the most natural environment for them to live and grow.

By the time we had six children, the shed had become a home, and we had a comfortable existence for our large family.

Life was good, maybe at times a little difficult, and we certainly did go through some trials with our own teenagers, but generally, life was good. We lived in a beautiful country and had our own home. Alan was satisfied with his work and his business was doing well. He managed to surf on the weekends with the kids and enjoyed playing squash and the occasional waterskiing trip. In addition to caring for a home and small farm, and also raising six children, I did quite a lot of voluntary work, that is, within the church and with Surf Life Saving, which had a huge impact on us as a family. We were also fortunate to spend our annual holidays camping; skiing and snowboarding at Australia's Mt. Kosciusko.




When our six children were young adults, we decided to 'give something back', so Alan and I, as well as our youngest daughter Hannah, embarked on another adventure where we were able to help hundreds of underprivileged and migrant children, and have now made a home for 50 very special young people at '**Misión México**'.



Every marriage has to be worked at and ours was no exception.

We were not exempt from trials and tribulations, especially during the 11 years in Mexico, where Alan and I had to learn to have a lot of patience; with the children in our care; with a new language and culture; with our living conditions; and our relationship.

At times we have been seriously stressed, to the point of wondering whether we could possibly continue doing this work. It has been one of the most difficult journeys one could embark on, that is, to live in a strange country and literally build a home for 50 troubled children and adolescence; to love them unconditionally; to cope with not enough money and yet try and provide for their every need; to be burdened by their pain and to try and counsel them; to lift them up when they are down; to try and correct the wrongs of their upbringing and instill in them good values and respect; and so much more; and, for Alan and I to still have a marriage relationship!


